'Cover' Illustration for MT2020

St Luke hard at work writing his gospel with his friendly (winged) ox at his feet. Note too in the background, he is painting a portrait, almost certainly of the Blessed Virgin Mary – as the Gospel of Luke contains the most extended passages about the mother of Jesus, and this was a very popular way to depict him in art. Since early Christian times, the four Evangelists – Matthew, Mark, Luke and John and the gospels bearing their names, have been represented in art by a winged creatures: a man for St Matthew, a lion for St Mark, an ox for St Luke, and an eagle (already with wings, one assumes) for St John.

This illustration comes from our own Special Collection of manuscripts and is part of a Latin translation of the New Testament by the great Christian Humanist scholar Erasmus of Rotterdam (d. 1536, the scholarship is named for him) and is probably from the southern Netherlands. *CCC MS 13 (vol II is MS 14)*
