Corpus Christi Day is our Name Day. It was one of the most popular holy days in the middle ages and the dedication of our College by Bishop Fox reflects its wide appeal. Now, as then, the day celebrates God's gift to humanity of community and the Eucharist. We start outside in the Quad if dry – in the Chapel, if not.
